## **Biographical Information**

Sidney G. Frazier was born in Denver in 1899. He graduated from Regis College before receiving his architectural training at Columbia University. Upon graduation in 1909 he began his career as a draftsman in the Denver office of the Baerresson Brothers architectural firm. Later that same year, Frazier went to work in the Denver office of William E. Fisher.

During the eight years he worked for Fisher (1909-1917), Frazier was occasionally loaned out to the Denver office of Robert Roeschlaub & Sons. While with Roeschlaub, Frazier worked on Greeley's Meeker High School, Centennial High School in Pueblo, and the Isis Theater in Denver.

Frazier opened his own office in Casper, Wyoming, in 1917. He interrupted his architectural career to serve in the U.S. Army during World War I. Following his discharge in 1919, he went to work for William Stickney's architectural firm in Pueblo where he supervised the construction of the Auditorium Building. He also enlisted as a captain in the Colorado National Guard. Later in 1919, Frazier received his Colorado architectural license and opened his own office in Greeley. He practiced as the only licensed architect in the community for the next forty-five years.

Frazier designed over 250 buildings in Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Utah and Washington. He specialized in schools and college buildings. In addition to the Chemistry Building at Colorado A&M (now Colorado State University), he designed forty-five schools throughout northern Colorado.

Frazier utilized a variety of architectural styles, including Collegiate Gothic, Neo-Classical, Art Deco and Moderne. Among his notable commissions are the Burlington and Loveland Armories (both National Register listed), the Glover Veterinary School (Colorado A&M), the Greeley Tribune Building, the Greeley Junior High School, and the Ault High School (State Register listed). He also participated in the Associated Architects for the State Capitol Annex, the collaboration responsible for the design of the 1939 State Capitol Annex in Denver.

### COLORADO ARCHITECTS BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Frazier closed his Greeley office in 1954 and move to Littleton with his wife. In retirement he served as a consultant to the State Planning Commission. He died in 1962 and was buried in Denver's Fairmont Cemetery.
