Biographical Information

William A. Lang was born in 1846 in Chillicothe, Ohio, one of many children in a family that moved often. They settled in Illinois for a period of time prior to the Civil War. During the war, Lang served in Company G of Lowell's Regiment, Second Illinois Light Artillery, the same unit as his father (though his father was twice discharged). After the war, Lang returned to his family in Illinois where he took up farming. At this point, details of Lang's life become somewhat sketchy. He worked on roofing of houses and it is thought that he may have gained some building experience through this trade. However, there is no documentation to show that Lang received any formal training in architecture. Much of what he picked up was probably through observation and widely available pattern books. The family moved constantly, ending up in Albion, Nebraska, where Lang married in 1879 and started a prosperous grocery business. It is here in Nebraska that Lang began his career as an architect, selling his grocery business to his partner in 1884. After designing one of his two commercial buildings (the 2nd would be in Denver) and a school in 1884, Lang became restless and moved to Denver by mid-to-late 1885. He was already listed as an architect and building superintendent in the 1886 Denver City Directory.

Lang burst onto the Denver building scene at the peak of economic activity with a fast and furious pace. He designed over 250 buildings in his brief career in Denver, including a church (St, Mark's Parish), townhouses (Vine St.), barns, a commercial building (A.M. Ghost Building), and numerous residential dwellings. He was known as Denver's residential architect. Perhaps most well known are the Molly Brown House (1890) and Castle Marne (1890), which show Lang's preference for rusticated stone, turrets, arches, and a grandness of scale. His recognizable eclectic style was used not only on these large imposing mansions but also on townhouses (a few of which remain) and what he termed "moderate cost housing." Although he left Illinois before Richardsonian architecture made its mark on Chicago, it is apparent that this style-albeit somewhat tailored to his taste-had a great impact on Lang. It is difficult to pin Lang down to a definite style, for he merged many elements from different styles to suit his taste, not following convention.

Lang designed most of his buildings in the early 1890s and was severely impacted by the Panic of 1893. It effectively ended his career as an architect and sent him in a downward spiral from which he would never recover. He sold his opulent townhouse in 1895 and all of his possessions before being admitted to St. Luke's Hospital in 1896. Lang was diagnosed with dementia in March 1897 and discharged to his brother's care in Illinois. He disappeared from his brother's house on August 7th and was killed instantly when hit by a train on August 21st, 1897. While Lang had a brief but productive career in Denver, he left a legacy in his eclectic buildings that reveal the prosperity of Denver's early years.
